

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#### Young Bradford Poets

Students from Years 5 and 7 have begun working on the Young Bradford Poets Project. It is a collaborative project between the National Literacy Trust and the Bronte Parsonage Museum.

The project will develop students' knowledge and understanding of the Brontes as local writers and aims to improve pupils' enjoyment of writing and their attitudes to poetry.

During the course of the project the students will be working with Mrs Parr in the library working on themes of identity and journeys. They will also work with two professional poets and have the chance to participate in a performance event with other schools across Bradford.

The first element of the project was a trip to Bronte Parsonage Museum where students discovered more about the life and works of the Brontes and created their own versions of Anne Bronte's poem 'Lines composed in a wood on a windy day'.
