At Appleton Academy, homework is seen as a valuable way of revising and extending work undertaken in school, of discovering information not available in school, of involving parents in their children's studies and of developing the self-discipline essential for good habits of study. It is our policy to set homework on a regular basis as detailed in the Year 7 homework timetable below and in student planners.

- All homework should take about 30-45 minutes to complete (unless this is project based).
- A variety of homework tasks will be set including written work, research, revision, project work and preparation for future work.
- We also have a range of online learning packages to support your child's work such as www.Hegartymaths.com , www.Senecalearning.com and www.Educake.co.uk They will be used by some subjects instead of paper based homework. Your child will have received usernames and passwords for these resources.
- Students record the homework task in their planner, please check and sign the student planner each week.
- Teachers will set homework as appropriate for the course and on the day stated in students' planners
- To make good progress in their learning it is essential that student's complete homework to the best of their ability. Please talk to your child about their homework and support them in organising their time to ensure homework is handed in on time.
- If students need support with homework, please encourage them to talk to their subject teacher.



- Whilst we value the importance of homework in consolidating or extending your child's learning, it can become an unmanageable task for teachers to chase students who were set homework and choose not to do it. Therefore, if your child fails to complete three consecutive pieces of homework, we will presume that you do not wish your child to continue to receive homework and staff will no longer inform you or issue a sanction to your child should they not complete it.

If you have concerns about homework, you should refer these in the first instance to the subject teacher.
