## Appleton Academy's new phone policy has "transformed school!"



At Appleton Academy we are delighted to have been featured in the Telegraph and Argus featuring our new mobile phone policy that came into place in September this year.

"We're really noticing a sense of calm around our young people - they seem to be in a better place, they seem to be happier".

Students are now physically unable to access their phones during the school day as they are placed in special pouches which can only be unlocked by pupils at home time.

It came after teachers noted a significant rise in issues brought about by young people using their phones and accessing social media while at school. "We saw such a big rise in phone and social media use which was having a negative impact within the school and leading to well-being issues.

"It was having a very significant impact on the general wellbeing of our young people, so we realised this couldn't go on and we needed to make a change."

After carrying out research, staff learned about a company called Phone Locker, which supplies special pouches for mobiles with the intention of helping pupils to "maintain focus and achieve more" at school, according to its website.

"This new policy is giving pupils a six-hour break from the noise and the harms that come from social media."

"Many pupils tell us they feel happier and they're having fewer social issues.

"They've adapted very quickly, so we'd like to say a big well done to them.

"Staff members are really enjoying the change too.



Thank you to all staff, students, and families who made the evening such a success. We can't wait to welcome our new cohort and see where their choices take them!



## Year 7 Art







### Niamh


## Year 8 Art and Design

















In Product Design, Year 8 have been working on designing sound amplifiers. They have explored how form and function work together, using creative design thinking to produce innovative concepts.


## Year 9 Art















Local RAPP artist, Wilko Wilkes helped us celebrate National Poetry Day. He worked with a group of Year 8 students to create 16 bar raps!



I learnt how pain is managed and recovery is optimised as well as processes that help speed this up. In my experience I was made aware of various illnesses, conditions ,how to spot them, treat them and stop the spread. This was hugely beneficial to my future career aspirations as well as educating me further and allowing me to gain lots of advice from different professionals.

#### **Nimrit Dhillon:**

In July , I was given the opportunity to complete a weeks of work experience at a local Dental Practice. I got to watch different dentists treat patients with everything from regular checkups to bigger treatments. I was also able to complete some admin work and help sterilize instruments. It was really interesting to see how each member of the team contributed during appointments. Going to the Dental Practice for my work experience has helped me to realise that to get to that point i need to start working hard now.
